- Continued analysis of previous years results by course teachers to identify items and curricular outcomes that require more instructional attention while also keeping in mind the diverse nature of learners in these classrooms and unique make-up of each class from year to year.
- Focus on Math 6 and ELAL 6 as they transition to a second year of implementation and will have our students write regular PAT 6 exams. Teachers will use experience from previous year's field tests to prepare students.
- Having moved to year-long Math and ELA courses in Grade 9, we will look to evaluate and assess whether a semester delivery will be more effective and positively impact student achievement for the 2025/2026 school year.
- Course teachers will be encouraged to participate in PAT marking in June and with field tests in April/
